

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE WATER: THE JOURNEY OF A HAITIAN RARA BAND IN BROOKLYN

Jeremy Robins & Magali Damas, 2011, 57 min. Part carnival, part vodou ceremony, and part grassroots protest, rara originally served as a voice of the slaves in their revolt against the French, and as the voice of those struggling against ongoing dictatorships in Haiti. This documentary follows the journey of Djarara - the only sustained rara band in America - through a hidden New York landscape of vodou temples, underground economies, violent politics, and ground-shaking music. Combining archival footage and vérité narratives, this documentary focuses on the journey of the poetic visionary Pé Yves, Djarara's leader. Yves has led a rara movement in New York since the late 80s, through an era when the media accused Haitians of

bringing AIDS to America, to times of civil chaos in Haiti, to police brutality riots in New York – each time re-imagining rara as a voice for an evolving diaspora. Ultimately, The Other Side of the Water is about the struggle to merge the traditional and the modern; the island and the City; the imagined and the real. The documentary tells the story of one man who learns to hold true to a vision; a motley band that comes to speak for a larger community; and a music that manages to create a new meaning of home in the diaspora. EBONY GODDESS: QUEEN OF ILÊ AIYÊ

Carolina Moraes-Liu, 2010, 20 min.

Documentary follows three women competing to be the carnival queen of Ilê Aivê, a prominent and controversial Afro-Brazilian group with an all-black membership. The selection is based on Afro-centric notions of beauty, in counterpoint to prevailing standards of beauty in Brazil, a country famous for slim supermodels and plastic surgery. Contestants for the title of Ebony Goddess dress in flowing African-style garments, gracefully performing traditional Afro-Brazilian dances to songs praising the beauty of black women. NEW **FAVELA RISING**

Documents a man and a movement, a city divided and a favela united. Haunted by the murders of his family and many of his friends, Anderson Sá is a former drug-trafficker who turns social revolutionary in Rio de Janeiro's most feared slum. Through Hip-Hop music, the rhythms of the street, and Afro-Brazilian dance he rallies his community to counteract the violent oppression enforced by teenage drug armies and sustained by corrupt police. 
NEWSAINTS RISING

Hailima Yates, 2008, 45 min.

A documentary presenting the voices of New Orleans years after Hurricane Katrina hit the region and the breech of the levees. New Orleans residents and volunteers discuss the troubles that were left behind after the waters resided: the violent and militarized response, the housing crisis, the difficulties in obtaining financial assistance/relief funds, what happened to the relief funds, how the youth have been mentally affected, and the grass-roots movement to rebuild the city and their lives.

This movie is not about the hurricane but the ethical treatment of human beings. The residents express the mistreatment and abandonment they experienced after the failed emergency relief efforts by FEMA and the Bush administration, which in the end, set the standard for making a change for future disasters. This documentary answers how organizations distributed the means and gives insight on how millions of dollars, supplies and contracts were offered in aid relief, yet years later, the city remains devastated. *DVD Purchase:* \$175


NEWBLAZE:

The Hip-Hop Christian movement has been uplifting the youth by delivering positive religious messages. *Blaze: The Truth through Hip-Hop*, informs youth about the artists in this growing music genre, who do not speak on drugs, sex, or hate but have messages of hope and peace in their songs. NEW PROMISED LAND

Yoruba Richen, 2010, 57 min. Part of the 2010 P.O.V. Documentary Series. Though apartheid ended in South Africa in 1994, economic injustices between blacks and whites remain unresolved. As revealed in Yoruba Richen's incisive Promised Land, the most potentially explosive issue is land. The film follows two black communities as they struggle to reclaim land from white owners, some of whom who have lived there for generations. Amid rising tensions and wavering government policies, the land issue remains South Africa's "ticking time bomb," with far-reaching consequences for all sides. Promised Land captures multiple perspectives of citizens struggling to create just solutions. "With tolerance and compassion, it focuses on the individual faces behind South Africa's prolonged striving to become a moral society." -- Transition Magazine. NEW BETWEEN THE CUP AND THE ELECTION

Monique Mbeka Phoba & Guy Kabeya Muya, 2010, 57 min. Inspired by the 2006 elections in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, former Zaire, a group of film students sets out to make a film. With the help of veteran filmmakers Monique Mbeka Phoba and Guy Kabeya Muya, the young students track down members of the 1974 Leopards, Zaire's national soccer squad, the first team from sub-Saharan Africa to qualify for the World Cup. After a dismal first round performance -- the Leopards were outscored 14-0 in three games -- the players



returned home in disgrace and drifted into obscurity. The team's captain, however, has fared better and is running for political office in Kinshasa. Deftly weaving past and present, Between The Cup and The Election offers a personal and endearing study of the intersection between sport and politics. DVD Purchase: \$225

They are on a mission to empower the forgotten youth of Africa from within, while spreading their message of hope around the globe. Narrated by Spearhead singer Michael Franti, follow the Bataka movement to amplify the spirit of the next generation in this musical journey.


NEW HIROSHIMA NAGASAKI DOWNLOAD


